


painting on wood burning, he also makes armor.


He says; "While fighting is what first brought me in, I eventually fell in love with all the other aspects of the society. It has really given me an opportunity to work on my art.










#### Dear Beda Venerabilis



From Nuremberg Chronicle, 1493

**Dear Beda**, Is Thanksgiving, with its tradition of turkey and pumpkin pies really an original holiday that started in America? Or did it come to us from Europe like so many other holidays?

Turkey, cranberries, pumpkin, sweet potatoes, green-beans, and pecans are all American foods. But are these the foods of the first Thanksgiving? Probably not. There is only ONE firsthand account of the original Thanksgiving in 1621. It was one paragraph in a letter written by the Pilgram, Edward Winslow. He wrote "Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together, after we had gathered the fruits of our labors; they four in one day killed as much fowl, as with a little help beside, served the Company almost a week, at which time amongst other Recreations, we exercised our Arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and amongst the rest their greatest king Mas-

sasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted, and they went out and killed five Deer, which they brought to the Plantation and bestowed on our Governor, and upon the Captain and others. And although it be not always so plentiful, as it was at this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want, that we often wish you partakers of our plenty."

#### Dear Beda.

Winslow only mentions fowl and deer as foods, so where did we get our traditional foods from?

Did the first Americans simply mimicked or adapted the traditional fare, flavor combinations and rituals of Europe? Yes, and No.

Usually, our dinner meal is eaten in the evening, but on Thanksgiving dinner is eaten in the afternoon, rather than in the evening.

Afternoon was the time that a proper dinner was served 400 years ago, and carving the meat at the table had become fashionable in the 17<sup>th</sup> century, when the first Thanksgiving occurred, so the time of the meal, and the tradition of having the turkey on a platter and carved at the table is straight out of Europe.

The art of carving meat was taught to boys and men at school. My English father had to learn those skills when he was boy in school in the early 1900's came straight from Europe. While turkey is an American bird, it has been introduced to Europe and was very popular there, so the main dish of turkey also came from Europe, by way of America years earlier.

What about cranberry sauce? In medieval Europe, sour fruit sauce with wild fowl was a popular combination, one that balanced a cold and moist condiment with a hot, dry meat. So cranberry sauce was a local adaptation of a mideival culinary practice.

Back then it wasn't a lavish meal without a lot of spices, cinnamon, nutmeg, clove and ginger being some of the most popular. Sound familiar?

"French beans" (from America) were already well-known and loved in 17th-century Europe. It was said that French beans "far exceed and are much better than other pulses eaten green." https://digital.lib.uiowa.edu/islandora/object/ui:jmrbr 1874

Candied yams were also a 16th-century staple. Shakespear even mentions them in <u>The Merry Wives of Windsor</u>. Famed English chef Robert May in the mid-17th-century cookbook *The Accomplisht Cook* has a great recipe for (sweet) potato pie. But how about pumpkin pie?

In the 17th century, it was already quite common. One of the earliest female cookbook authors, Hannah Woolley, has a recipe for "pompion-pye" with the same spices we use today.

So, it looks like our traditional Thanksgiving foods came from Europe, although the main ingredients had originated in America years earlier.


About the date. Why the third Thursday in November, when the original Thanksgiving was in mid-October, not November? Since George Washington's time, Thursday has been the designated day, and this was solidified by Abraham Lincoln's proclamation in 1863, designating the National Day of Thanksgiving to be the last Thursday of November. 


