





Book Reviews



When I got a job teaching in Japan in the early 90's, I decided I needed to learn about the culture and people as much as possible, so I started reading books about Japan.

After reading several books, it dawned on me that I was reading books about Japan as seen through the eyes of westerners. I decided I should, instead, read the writings of Japanese authors.

The first Japanese book I found in English was "Musashi". Boy, was I in for a treat! It is a well written biographical novel that I could not put down. While not its intent, it taught me a lot about the culture and values of Japan in the Edo period. It is evident that these same values are reflected in today's culture

Let me tell you a bit about this book.

It is a wonderfully written (and wonderfully translated) historical novel that had me hooked within the first few chapters. One of those books you stay up all night reading.


It reminded me a bit of Clavell's "Shogun," because they both are placed in the Edo period, however "Shogun" looks at Japan through a foreigner's eyes and focuses on court intrigue, while "Musashi" tells of everyday life in Japan – the peasantry, samurai, Geishas, priests, monks, and families.

The book is based on the life of Musashi, who was on the losing side at the Battle of Sekigahara, after which he undertakes a lifelong journey across Japan, perfecting his sword skills and eventually becoming the most prestigious swordsman ever. During this journey he deals with love, betray and intrigue.

This is a very short summary of a very long (1000 + pages) and intriguing book. I think it is time for a reread. This time with a highlighter in hand, so I can mark some of wonderful passages that I cannot find easily now.

Dear Beda, Besides Christmas, what other holidays were celebrated in December during the medieval period?

While modern December holidays often center around Christmas, the medieval world had a collection of festivities based on religious, cultural, and seasonal significance. One big celebration was Advent, the period of preparation leading up to Christmas. It included fasting, prayer, and anticipation of the birth of Christ.

But it wasn't all religious festivals. In Scandinavia, Yule—a pagan festival that predates medieval times—was widely celebrated. It

was the celebration of the winter solstice where communities gathered for the "Yule Feast" with revelry, music, and dancing to commemorate the turning point of the darkest days and the promise of brighter times ahead. Later it was integrated into Christmas traditions. Yule involved the burning of the Yule log, feasting, and activities aimed at invoking the return of longer days and the sun's warmth.

The Feast of St. Nicholas on December 6th was celebrated in many European regions. It included gift-giving and acts of charity. Some believe it led to the creation of "Santa Claus".

Hanukkah, the Jewish Festival of Lights, often fell within or near December, bringing its own set of traditions, including the lighting of the menorah and the exchange of gifts.

In parts of medieval Europe, the Feast of St. Lucia, celebrated on December 13th, honoring the Christian martyr. There were processions, candlelight, and the selection of a girl to portray St. Lucia, symbolizing light in the darkness.

These diverse celebrations highlight the richness of December festivities in the medieval period, reflecting a blend of pagan traditions, religious observances, and cultural practices. 

The medieval December was a time of communal bonding, reflection, and anticipation, offering a fascinating glimpse into the historical roots of our contemporary holiday season.








